These barriers result in high referrals to specialized care, an easier option than drug initiation titration, monitoring, and adjustments, which leads to prolonged wait-times, resulting in patients often remaining unmanaged and seeking care in urgent or emergent settings for episodic management [10,11]. "

The purpose of the study is to assess the effectiveness of an electronic alert to assist headache management. It tests the hypothesis that "electronic alert for management of headache improves patient reported headache burden at six months among headache patients managed in primary care. "
