Celebrate the centennial of **Charles Mingus**, the jazz legend who died in 1979. The Secrest Artists Series partners with the departments of **African American Studies** and **English** to host three days of exciting events, culminating in a major concert from Grammy-nominated the Mingus Big Band.

The ensemble tours extensively in the United States and abroad, and has eleven recordings to its credit, six of which have been nominated for

Grammys.

The WFUSO will close the evening with Beethoven's iconic and moving Symphony No. 5 in C minor.

Ammar Basha, Wake Forest's first Artist Protection Fund fellow to be placed in residence, screened his film work and hosted a premiere reading of scenes from

his new screenplay. An initiative of the Institute of International Education, the Artist Protection Fund (IIE-APF) fills a critical unmet need by protecting threatened artists and placing them at welcoming host institutions in safe countries where they can continue their work and plan for their futures. IIE-APF places these artists in safe havens for a full year and provides fellowship funding, mentoring, and inclusion in a comprehensive network of artistic and social support. The Artist Protection Fund is sponsored by the Mellon Foundation. Ammar Basha's residency was spearheaded by the Interdisciplinary Arts Center.

A new grant from Guilford College will allow Basha's residency to be extended for an additional 3-6 months.

Research Travel Grants to travel to the UK and
Germany in relation to his new book project "Critical
Distance: Black American Artists in Europe 19581968." The book considers Black American artists
moving to and working in Europe in the 1960s and
argues that these sojourns not only provided the artists
an escape from the racism and exclusionary practices



of the postwar American art world but also allowed them the critical distance of a voluntary exile, as well as exposure to the varied artistic traditions developing throughout Europe.

Dr. Curley was also invited to be one of three core faculty members for the "Linking (Art) Worlds" series of traveling seminars, co-sponsored by the Terra Foundation and the Getty Foundation, in Prague and Budapest over the summer and fall.





Julius Caesar

By William Shaekspeare, directed by Mark Cohen Oct. 28 - Nov. 6

A breathless political thriller, Julius Caesar follows the unscrupulous

machinations of Senate power-brokers who hold in their hands the fate of their Republic. From backroom to battlefield, Shakespeare's first great tragedy rips back the curtain on how our politicians really hammer out their world-altering decisions, how they spin those decisions for a ravenous public, and how we all live with the consequences that those decisions bring down on us. Julius Caesar is the riveting turning point in Shakespeare's career-long obsession with our relationship to evil played out against the glare of the political spotlight, and keyed to the music of high rhetoric and falling bombs.

Mark Cohen (Professor of Acting, Boston University) is directing this production as part of the Patricia Severin Rovere Guest Artist Fund. Local Winston-Salem community resident Patricia Severin Rovere adored the arts, particularly the theater, opera, musical theater and dance. The Patricia Severin Rovere Artist Fund for Theatre was established by a generous gift given by her daughter Elizabeth Rovere O'Kelley ('89). The fund empowers the Theatre program to bring a guest artist to campus to lead the production of a theatrical performance.


