REVIEWERS' COMMENTS:

Reviewer #1 (Remarks to the Author):

I have provided a referee report on an earlier version of this submission, and the authors have duly prepared an itemization of the changes they have carried out in response to those comments. I am pleased to confirm that they have satisfactorily incorporated my feedback.

My evaluation of this paper is that it offers insightful analyses of the mechanisms that can prove helpful in seeking to mitigate food shortages. There are admittedly additional phenomena that could be considered in the analysis (e.g., correlations in the weather patterns of neighboring regions). Yet introducing such a level of detail could detract from the paper's readability whilst it could prove challenging to validate such more detailed models (in fact, the eventual food shortages may depend on how (un)stable the political situation in West Africa remains, during the last four years, there have been seven military coups in Central and West Africa; yet such developments are practically impossible to predict).

Against this background, I recommend that this paper be accepted for publication essentially "as is"; but in preparing their final version of the paper, they may wish to clarify the positioning of their work relative to those uncertainties that their model does not capture.
