core of individuals that support the College and the work we do. We are grateful to all of our supporters from across the district and beyond who enable us to serve students.

As you may already know, I have announced my retirement and the Board is actively seeking a new Southwest Tech president. It has been a pleasure to serve the people of southwest Wisconsin and be part of the fabric of this wonderful region. As my impending retirement approaches, I would like to do a bit of reminiscing.

My first teaching stint at Southwest Tech was in 1971 as the Business Machines instructor. This was a new program highlighting key punch machines, calculators, mimeograph, and other copying machines. In addition students learned typing, filing and basic accounting. Like other obsolete programs, Business Machines has gone by the wayside and has been replaced with programs that address current workforce demands.

After that I left for a few years following my husband, Doug, and his career. When he landed in Dodgeville, I returned to Southwest Tech as the Clerk Typist instructor, another program that has become obsolete. Within a couple of years I was afforded the opportunity to be the Chairperson of Business and Marketing and served in that position until 1985. My most memorable experience in that role was the purchase of the first instructional computers on the campus. These computers were to be used in the accounting program and we debated where to locate them within the division to provide the most student access. An additional highlight was the startup of the Data Processing program that has since been replaced with several Information Technology programs. An asset of the Wisconsin Technical College System is its ability to change and change quickly to meet the needs of the state and region.

From there I became an academic vice president at a sister technical college returning to Southwest Tech in 1999 as President. It seems impossible that I have been in this position for a dozen years. Over those twelve years the College has grown the number of students it serves; modified, added and discontinued program offerings; incorporated new technologies; assisted in business recruitment and retention; grew the number of credit transfer agreements; celebrated its 40th anniversary; and passed a capital referendum for building remodeling. There are many great memories but the best is listening to student graduation speakers sharing their stories of how Southwest Tech has played a positive role in their life.

Southwest Tech's service theme "We change lives by providing opportunities for success," applies to staff as well as students. Southwest Tech has provided me with many opportunities to be of service on the local, state, and national level. I have enjoyed my time here at Southwest Tech and I thank you for placing your trust in me.





Human Patient Simulation


With the new Health Science Center, Southwest Tech is now able to offer live scenario training and skill assessment testing using Human Patient Simulation. Through grant funding and referendum

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support, Southwest Tech has established an advanced Human Patient Simulator Laboratory and Mobile Simulation training capabilities.

The 4-room high fidelity laboratory suite mimics

the acute care setting with "real life" interactive emergency, medical, and pediatric patients exhibiting symptoms of disease, distress, labs, medication reactions, respiratory changes, and cardiac changes. Participants in the simulation lab are able to act and react without negative repercussions as patient presentations and scenarios are revealed. Participants

Southwest Tech's mobile simulation training includes an ambulance and two human patient simulators that

will allow for field training for the entire district's volunteer emergency medical service personnel and rural healthcare providers. This mobile simulation capability allows Southwest Tech the flexibility to bring training to participants from multiple facilities and disciplines to

Dental/Medical Clinic

Southwest Tech's commitment to the community continues with the

establishment of a state-of-the-art dental and medical clinic. Southwest Tech is currently exploring options on campus to provide dental, medical, and mental health services to students, the medically underserved, and uninsured. The clinic houses 4 dental operatories, an exam room, digital x-ray equipment, and lab. The medical side of the clinic offers exam rooms, special intake areas, ECG equipment, electronic charting areas, and is conducive to the delivery of health services as well as educational offerings in health occupations programming.

Child Care Center



The new Child Care Center is designed not only as a training ground for Southwest Tech students, but as a safe daytime venue for infants through school-age children of students and college staff.

Ag/Auto Center



The Ag/Auto Center accommodates laboratories, classrooms, offices, and storage for the programs that train students in the expanding fields of agricultural equipment, automotive services, and auto collision repair.

The new Ag/Auto Center was built to:

- Enable students to train indoors on larger modern agricultural equipment.
- Allow Southwest Tech ag programs to respond to evolving needs for agriculture training created by advances in farming technology.
- Expand Automotive Technician and Auto Collision Repair and Refinishing Technician programs to feature a broader curriculum and state-of-the-industry equipment used to maintain and repair today's complex vehicles.
- Increase the level of lab safety by providing larger work stations capable of accommodating student projects that often involve the complete disassembly of ag equipment, trucks, and other vehicles under repair.


This center was built to:

- Create a child care training center that will qualify for national accreditation by providing numerous large windows that allow outdoor viewing and natural light; a big indoor play area for large motor skill development; and special rooms for the care of sick children.
- Improve hands-on clinical learning for Child Care Services and Early

Childhood Education program students.

- Provide convenient day care for an increasing number of students with small children.
- Incorporate the latest safety features and create a child-friendly environment.

Coming August 15, 2011! Public Safety Complex



The new Public Safety Complex is being built to:

- Create a comprehensive facility to train more volunteer firefighters, emergency medical services personnel, and law enforcement.
- Expand training available to firefighters and other rescue personnel in tactics such as fire suppression, ventilation, search and rescue, rope rescue, advanced extrication, and hazmat mitigation.
- Provide a safer, more controlled training environment for law enforcement officers, firefighters, and other public safety professionals.
- Allow more multi-agency training.
- Hold certified firefighter examinations in this region and better serve local volunteers.

Campus Renovations

When so many Southwest Tech programs moved to new facilities on campus, it freed up additional space for other programs to move into. Nearly 75 percent of all programs at the College have been positively impacted by the recent campus expansion and renovation. Some of the programs that now enjoy increased student capacity and updated learning space include Engineering Technologist, Bricklaying & Masonry, Electric Power Distribution, Building Trades/Carpentry, Esthetics/Spa Services, CNC Operator/Setup, Welding, and many others.



Engineering Technologist

The Engineering Technologist program combines the foundational skills related to industrial engineering with the skills of computerized manufacturing. The program has been enhanced from its original design to now allow students the ability to study how integrated systems can improve efficiency in a manufacturing environment. Campus renovations

created a new lab space for learning about automated controls and a complete computer numerical controlled (CNC) shop that is shared with the CNC Setup/Operator program.

New Technology in the Classroom

A new generation of high technology classrooms has become a reality on the Southwest Tech campus thanks in part to the team at Lifeline Amplification Systems, located in Platteville.

Driven by technology trends and faculty requests, these state-of-the-art classroom designs make it easy

for faculty to show computer or video output to a room full of students with the push of a button. The objective of the new classrooms was to make audio-visual equipment use in the classroom as simple, friendly and non-intimidating as possible.



Bricklaying & Masonry

Students in the Bricklaying & Masonry program learn to use brick, mortar, and block to build walls, arches, corners, fireplaces, and paving surfaces. Like most Southwest Tech trades programs, applied hands-on learning is a cornerstone of the learning process. This often times means creating large student projects that can

take up a lot of space in a laboratory. The new Bricklaying & Masonry lab offers plenty of room for student projects and an updated classroom for instructor lectures.




Esthetics/Spa Services

Working in a fully functioning spa has been an integral part of the Esthetician/ Spa Services program. In the program students explore the exciting world of health and beauty with a special emphasis on skin care, facial treatments, wraps, electrotherapy, aromatherapy, massage,

retail operation, product chemistry, hair removal, and makeup application. Classroom learning is reinforced with students applying their skills in the Creative Elements Spa which is open Wednesdays from 11:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Electric Power Distribution

The referendum allowed the College to open new programs. Southwest Tech recently started a new Electric Power Distribution (EPD) program which quickly filled with 20 excited students. Regional demand for power line technicians is high as the industry experiences retirements. Southwest Tech started the new EPD program after receiving requests from the energy industry to meet existing and anticipated workforce demands. In the one-year EPD program students practice the installation, maintenance, and operation of electrical systems to supply electricity to residential, commercial, and industrial customers, and joint gas and electric generation facilities.





Welding

Before the campus renovation, the welding lab was the very definition of the referendum campaign slogan "Things are Cramped at Southwest Tech!" Students had little room for their welding projects and needed a larger laboratory. The new welding labs are a much needed addition to the campus as students develop their skills at 19 different welding processes. "The best part of being on the Southwest Tech District Board is attending graduation. Seeing people achieve their goals is why we exist as a College."

Foundation Cuts Ribbon for New Apartment Building

On October 19, 2010, the Foundation held a ribbon cutting ceremony to open the newly constructed eight-unit apartment building at the on-campus student housing facility. The building will provide an additional 32 Southwest Tech students with on-campus living opportunities. This brings the total number to 92 students served through on-campus housing.

In 2007 the Foundation Board of Directors decided to move forward with the building project after reviewing the feasibility of additional housing. With the College expanding program offerings and lowering out-of-state tuition costs, the Foundation Board believed the demand for on-campus housing would increase. The Foundation submitted a loan application to the United States Department of Agriculture Rural Development and was notified in October 2008 that the application was accepted. The low interest rate loans offered through the Community Facilities Loan Program are the real driving force behind the on-campus student housing facility. Thanks to the assistance from Rural Development, this housing opportunity has become reality.

The Foundation would like to thank all of those involved with the building project. Midwest Builders of Fennimore won the bid for the project and worked diligently with their subcontractors to have the building ready this fall. American Bank, Fennimore, also assisted with the interim financing for the project. The students are enjoying their new apartments!


