Developing Our Strategic Plan

The Process and Engagement

- The College began Initial planning in the Spring 2022 with a presentation regarding the review of the College's Mission Statement, development of the Strategic Plan, by the Chancellor during Convocation (January 2022).
- The College Mission statement review was performed by College Council and voted on in December of 2022
- A timeline for the Strategic Plan process was presented to the college during fall convocation 2022
- The Society for College and University Planning (SCUP) provided professional development and training.
- For four (4) months the Steering Committee met every two weeks to create objectives and outcomes to each of the Four Imperatives.
- College Council review each imperative separately during the spring semester of 2023
- Three College Conversations were held during the spring semester of 2023 on campus for faculty, staff and students to give their input on the objectives and strategic outcomes, as well as come up with activities to fulfill those objectives and strategic outcomes.
- A community input meeting was held for the college to share their progress thus far, as well as a chance for the community to give their input.
- Tabling on the Strategic Plan was performed at the 2023 Sustainability Fair
- Makaloa/Faculty Senate/Student Government presentations were held
- A college conversation was held during the fall semester of 2023 to decide on which activities should be accomplished in the first one to two years
- The results of this college conversation were presented to College Council
